#### 4Q417 1 i (cf. Qimron, 2:148)

1 [... and] you, understanding one [...] 2 [...] to the wonderful mysteries of the God of awe you shall give attention. The principle [...] 3 [...] consider [the mystery of existence and the things] of old, why something exists, and what exists, 4 how [...] why 5 something existed, and what is to be, how [...] in all [...] deed and de[ed ...] 6 [... day] and night meditate on the mystery of existence (and) seek continuously. And then you will know truth and injustice, wisdom 7 [and foll]y [...] the deed [...] in all their paths with their tasks for all eternal periods, and eternal task. 8 And then you will know the difference between good and evil according to their works [...] for the God of knowledge is the foundation of truth, and through the mystery of existence 9 he expounded its basis. And its deeds [he prepared with all wi]sdom, and with all intelligence he formed it. And the dominion of its deeds 10 according to all [...] all [...] he expounded for their understanding for all its creatures, so that one would walk 11 in the nature of one understanding. And he expounded to m[an ...,] and through correct understanding the secrets 12 of his plan will become known, together with how one should walk [per]fectly [in all] one's deeds. Then you will know of [His] glorious st[rength toge]ther with His wonderful mysteries and His mighty deeds.
